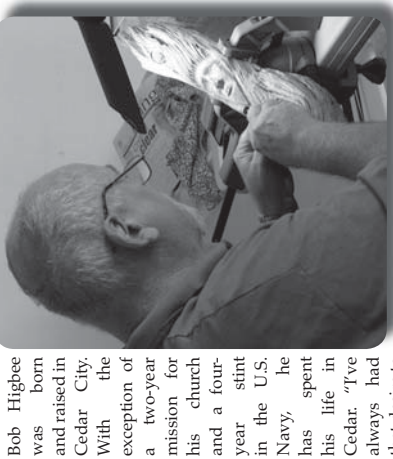

BOB HIGBEE WIND CHIMES AND WALKING STICKS



Bob Higbee was born and raised in Cedar City. With the exception of a two-year mission for his church and a four-year stint in the U.S. Navy, he has spent his life in Cedar. "I've always had that desire to know just what is around the next bend." Since there are many "next bends" in the area, he feels that this is paradise and never tires from exploring and poking around.

Bob has had many hobbies during his life. Black Powder guns were a lot of fun to make, wooden bowls, jewelry boxes, and hunting knives. "It seems that I have tinkered with just about everything at one time or another but woodcarving has brought me the most joy and has been the most challenging."



While throwing away the undeliverable "Junk Mail" at the post office about twelve years ago, one of the catalogs

opened to a picture of hand carved walking sticks. "Wow, if I could only make something like that it would be great."

Santa brought a Dremel Tool for Christmas that year and shortly after lunch Bob disappeared into the basement. His wife Virginia will say, "never to be seen nor heard from again." Without any training or guidance it was pretty much trial and error and learn as you go. "What I lack in talent I try to make up for in love and enthusiasm." A few years later while reading a book on carving driftwood came



the idea for hand carved wind chimes. The only problem is where does one order the chimes to hang. I guess I'll just have to make them too. Thus began the search for different types and shapes of chimes to hang from the carvings. Since the metal chimes are hand made, each one has its own personality and sound.

"This hobby has been so rewarding for me. It has brought me into contact with some of the most interesting people I have ever met. It gets me out in the hills and canyons looking for material. I gather driftwood from everywhere I travel. My wind chimes come from the beaches of British Columbia, the rivers of Colorado, the shores of Lake Powell, and every canyon with a stream or flood in it. Every summer storm brings new material down the canyon with the floods. After spending many hours with my sticks and chimes they are a little like my children. My sticks are out having adventures all over the world, going places I'll never see. My chimes are hanging out in fun places all the way from New York apartments to La Vegas patios. It is fun to think of them like that. When someone likes what you have created and is willing to go out of their way to tell you about it, it just doesn't get any better than that."
